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## English Grammar Reported Speech Rules

Reported speech - Indirect speech Simple Past. The simple past tense usually changes to the past perfect in reported speech. Change of tenses. The tenses, word-order, pronouns may be different from those in the direct speech sentence. The Past Perfect Tense does not change in the Reported Speech.

Introduction. In English grammar, we use reported speech to say what another person has said. We can use their exact words with quotation marks, this is known as direct speech, or we can use indirect speech. In indirect speech, we change the tense and pronouns to show that some time has passed. Indirect speech is often introduced by a reporting verb or phrase such as ones below.

Reported speech (Indirect Speech) is how we represent the speech of other people or what we ourselves say. Reported Speech focuses more on the content of what someone said rather than their exact words. The structure of the independent clause depends on whether the speaker is reporting a statement, a question or a command.

Indirect/reported speech, on the other hand, does not have to be within quotes or reported word-to-word. In fact, unless one is relaying the exact words spoken, one should never use quotation marks. Indirect speech examples: She told us that she wouldn't be coming home that night. She told him that she was happy.

In order to do this you can use direct or quoted speech, or indirect or reported speech. Direct Speech / Quoted Speech  
Saying exactly what someone has said is called direct speech (sometimes called quoted speech) Here what a person says appears within quotation marks ("...") and should be word for word.

## **English Grammar - direct speech - quoted speech and ...**

When the reporting verb is in the past tense, all present tenses in the direct speech will change into the corresponding past tenses. For example, the simple present will become simple past. He said, 'I want to go.' He said that he wanted to go.

## **Direct and indirect speech: an overview of the rules**

In the first sentence, I am conveying the activities of David in his (D) own words without changing it; it is called direct speech or we can say reporting speech. In the second sentence, I am using my own words to convey the activities of the speaker (D) to the audience. This we can say indirect speech or reported speech.

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
